We are so proud and truly humbled to present to you, our most dedicated supporters, CURE Childhood Cancer's 2018–2019 Annual Report. Within the pages that follow, you will see and realize what an impact you have made over the past twelve months in the lives of children and families devastated by a childhood cancer diagnosis. We are incredibly thankful for what you have enabled us to do by supporting CURE.

As you know, CURE's most urgent mission is to ensure all children with cancer have safe and effective cures. Continuing to advance research is the only path to those cures. With your donations, we were able to invest more than \$4 million in life-saving research at leading pediatric cancer research institutions across the nation. All of the research you funded is significant, but the advances made through our precision medicine initiative, which offers a gene-based approach to treatment for children with cancer, have been incredibly important. I can't wait for you to meet Lauren Stephens in the pages that follow. I feel confident you will agree that your funds were well spent.

While we work to advance treatments and get closer to cures for all childhood cancers, we are firmly resolved to support the families of children with cancer in meaningful and appropriate ways. Your generosity enabled us to serve meals to patients and families in the hospital, defray the unexpected costs of treatment through emergency funding, and provide many other tangible forms of assistance.

In 2018–2019, your support enabled us to increase the amount of financial assistance given to families to more than \$270,000 in the form of emergency funds, transportation assistance, and gas, grocery, and pharmacy cards. This aid directly impacted approximately 600 families in need. You also helped us to provide hotel rooms for a large number of families forced to travel for treatment. Your donations and volunteer support allowed us to serve meals to more than 17,500 patients and family members in Atlanta and Savannah, and to provide 1839 snack bags and 460 toiletry bags to families facing an unexpected hospital admission.

We also were able to care for the emotional needs of children and their families. In 2018–2019, with your support we hosted two bereavement retreats designed to help families cope with and move forward in their grief. We also provided 206 professional counseling sessions for patients, their siblings, and parents.

We can only do our work with the support of many people, organizations, groups, and businesses. We are honored to be the instruments through which this important work is done. Thank you – with all our hearts – for giving so much to CURE.

## Adding More Life to Lifetimes

The 21st century is already bursting with scientific discovery which is allowing people to live longer and more productive lives. Our goal is centered around children, and research is the key to unlocking breakthroughs that will save the lives of children diagnosed with cancer. Not only will research help children survive their diagnosis, but by developing safer and less toxic treatments, it will also help children who do survive experience fewer harmful side effects and live their lives to the fullest.

You enabled CURE to invest nearly \$4 million in promising research in 2018–2019. With your support, we funded 14 specific projects at leading pediatric cancer research institutions across the nation. Our highest priority is precision medicine, treatment targeted at tumor-driving genes, which is already yielding significant results for children with recurrent and hard to treat cancers.

A Scientific Advisory Council, comprised of scientists and clinicians, guided our funding decisions, ensuring through their thorough review process that your funds are being invested prudently. In addition to being scientifically sound, we aimed to fund research which is likely to have a clinical or therapeutic impact within five years.

## Precision Medicine Leads to a Future

When Lauren was only two years old, her parents noticed a lump in her abdomen and got the worst news imaginable. Their happy, beautiful baby was diagnosed with neuroblastoma – a pediatric cancer of the nervous system. They immediately entered a world of chemotherapy, radiation, surgery, and too many side effects to mention. But after several months, Lauren's tumor shrunk, and she was declared cancer-free.

When her health improved, Lauren dreamed of being a cheerleader. She joined a competitive squad and even made her school team. She loved every practice, meet, and football game, and she worked very hard to be her best. At 15, she was primed for high school cheering until she began experiencing hip and leg pain that sidelined her. Being so active, a doctor suggested she had arthritis in her hips, so her first attempt at recovery was physical therapy.

The PT actually helped for a time, but the pain came back. In February 2017, an MRI revealed new lesions. Once again, neuroblastoma had invaded Lauren's body. The cancer had spread to her bones, bone marrow, lung and pelvis. In all, the imaging indicated 28 spots that were likely active tumors.

The first four cycles of chemotherapy stabilized the tumors but didn't shrink them. Lauren moved on to immunotherapy, which is supposed to trigger the body's immune system to attack the cancer cells. She spent alternating weeks in the hospital for more than a year. That treatment failed also, so doctors next tried a form of treatment called MIBG therapy.

"MIBG made me very sick and uncomfortable," Lauren recalled. "I had to stay by myself in a room with lead

walls to contain the radiation. Even when I got out, I couldn't be around people for two weeks so I wouldn't expose them. We thought I might glow in the dark, but I never did."

After the treatment, Lauren's follow-up MRI showed 18 spots remaining. That was a good reduction, but not enough. Her doctor recommended that she undergo MIBG therapy again. That treatment took her disease burden down to 14 spots. Because she had already received her lifetime maximum dosage of radiation, more MIBG therapy wasn't possible.

Lauren had run out of treatment options.

When treatment options have been exhausted, there is little hope of survival. But through CURE's funding of the Aflac Precision Medicine Program, doctors have a new tool in their toolkit. Lauren was enrolled in the program to see if there was a genetic reason her cancer was resisting treatment. Genetic testing revealed Lauren's tumor had a genetic mutation for which there is a drug known to be effective. Lauren was immediately enrolled in a clinical trial for lorlatinib. She was given a single pill once a day, and after only four cycles, all bone metastases and bone marrow involvement had disappeared. Incredibly, the only tumor remaining is in her pelvis, and the latest scan suggests that it is now inactive.

Of course, Lauren is ecstatic with the results. She will be attending Spellman College in the fall of 2019. Despite the obstacles that cancer put in her way, she has a positive and hopeful attitude.

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## As Personalized as a Fingerprint

We're all unique. Unfortunately, today's childhood cancer treatments don't always take this difference into account. Instead, children's cancers are treated by disease type – one size fits all. But a chemotherapy that works for some children might not be effective for others because of genetic differences. As a result, some children undergo many rounds of toxic chemotherapy that never has a chance of working.

That's where precision medicine comes into play. An easy way to understand precision medicine is to think of it as personalized medicine. Through genetic testing, doctors look at the genetic change in a tumor to determine how a child's cancer will behave and the best way to treat it. By isolating the specific gene that is causing tumor growth, doctors can identify medications targeted at the tumor-driving gene which can then slow down or shut off the gene's activity. This can potentially slow, stop, or reverse the tumor's growth.

The latest, most promising treatments don't fire shots at a cancer patient's entire body by blindly attacking all dividing cells. Instead, they disarm the unique genetic mechanisms that allow tumors to grow.

At CURE, we believe children should have access to this emerging treatment approach. That's why precision medicine is our highest priority. Since 2017, you have enabled us to invest more than \$5.25 million in precision medicine initiatives. And we are just getting started.



## Investing in Tomorrow

CURE is committed to ensuring the best and brightest minds in science enter the field of pediatric oncology. To remove potential barriers, we fund the training of pediatric oncology fellows at Emory University School of Medicine. A fellow is a physician who has already completed a primary residency and is spending extra time in further training in the subspecialty of oncology. CURE's Fellowship Program

helps ensure that our future pediatric oncologists receive the very best training to become excellent clinicians and researchers while remaining committed to finding cures for children with cancer.

In 2018–2019, with your help, CURE fully supported two fellows (one through the Sam Robb Fund) – Dr. Jenny Shim and Dr. Rafi Kazi.



### Dr. Jenny Shim (Sam Robb Fellow)

Dr. Shim earned her MD at Albany Medical College in upstate New York and completed her residency in pediatrics at the University of Texas Southwestern in Dallas. She is currently focusing on basic and translational research in relapsed and high-risk neuroblastoma.

### Dr. Rafi Kazi

Dr. Kazi earned his undergraduate degree at Harvard University and his MD at the University of Arkansas. While in his residency, he focused his research on the role of the protein HMGB1 in mixed lineage leukemia. As a fellow, he will continue his investigation into protein interactions in difficult to treat leukemias as well as perform basic and translational research in the lab of Dr. Daniel Wechsler.

## Blessings in the Middle of the Storm

When Jessica Brandon received the call that her six-year-old son, Drew, had collapsed in the school cafeteria, she didn't know what to expect. Since she taught at the school, Jessica ran down to find him struggling to breathe. While she worked to calm Drew down, paramedics prepared him for a trip to the hospital.

Doctors in the ER assumed Drew was suffering from a virus and ordered a chest X-ray of his lung. The next person to enter his room was an oncologist, and Jessica's world changed forever. The X-ray showed a tumor the size of an adult's fist on Drew's chest wall between his lung and heart. His collapse was a result of the pressure exerted by the growing tumor pushing against his left lung. The same hospital had recently done an X-ray of his chest that showed nothing. Amazingly, the tumor had grown that large in just five weeks.

"When we learned about the tumor and put it all together, we realized just how lucky and blessed we were that he collapsed at school," Jessica shared. "The doctor said he could have just as easily gone to sleep one night and never woken up."

Drew was diagnosed with stage 4 T-cell lymphoblastic lymphoma. While the advanced stage of the disease was cause for concern, the prognosis was actually good because this type of childhood cancer carries an 85% survival rate. The treatment plan called for a strong regimen of chemotherapy that would last for three years and regular lumbar punctures to monitor Drew's bone marrow. He started chemo immediately, and within a month it had melted the large tumor in his chest. Additionally, the cancer in his bone marrow was almost nil.

But he wasn't done fighting. Drew seemed to suffer from every complication possible during his treatment. He got a blood clot in his shoulder that required blood thinners for several years, and that wasn't the worst of it.

Five months into treatment, Drew became very sick and was taken to the hospital. While the chemo was destroying the cancer, it was also depleting Drew's natural immune system. After a battery of tests, doctors discovered that five viruses had invaded his weakened body. They also learned that his heart was functioning at less than 30% of normal.

"They had no choice but to put him in an induced coma to let his body heal," Jessica explained. "He was in a coma for four weeks, and during that time, he coded twice. Both times they ushered us into the hall while they performed CPR on the other side of the door. We thought we had lost him."

But Drew is a tough one. In fact, Jessica calls him her fire-breathing dragon. Drew pulled through that difficult episode and took a little break from his cancer treatment to gain strength. Soon he was back to full chemo, and his body seemed to tolerate it better this time. He finished treatment in August 2018 and turned ten in February. He loves soccer, building with Legos, and playing Fortnite.

"Drew was old enough that he remembers his treatment – both the good and the bad," Jessica said. "He still hates having blood drawn. But the incredible doctors, nurses, and families we've met will always be a part of his life, and the blessings we received in the middle of the storm have made him stronger."

## We're there when people need us most

Childhood cancer is devastating to a family in so many ways. Not only must parents watch their children literally fight for their lives, they must also endure long family separations during treatment, financial uncertainties, and a myriad of other issues that can fracture even the strongest home. But your support allows CURE to be there when families need us most. Your donations have enabled us to create programs designed to meet a family's emotional, practical, and financial needs quickly and appropriately. CURE's unwavering support is available from diagnosis until we are no longer needed.



### EARLY OUTREACH PROGRAM

When parents hear the words, "your child has cancer," they immediately plunge into a world for which they are utterly unprepared. During this overwhelming time, CURE is there. Our goal is to simply be a comforting presence so they know they are not alone. Newly diagnosed families are given a CURE tote as a first touch. This tote contains many

useful items, including a tabbed binder which helps families organize the reams of information they receive during treatment and a tip booklet written by parents who have walked the same road. In 2018–2019, we delivered 337 CURE totes to newly diagnosed families.

### FAMILY EMERGENCY FUND

Dealing with childhood cancer can be an incredible strain in many ways, not the least of which is financial. Long-term treatments can be expensive, and with your gifts, CURE is able to help families with financial burdens caused by treatment. CURE staff work with hospital social workers to determine a family's eligibility for assistance and pay vendors and service providers directly to help with such things as housing, utilities, medical expenses, and transportation costs. In 2018–2019, your donations allowed CURE to help

441 families with more than \$200,000 in financial assistance. We provided an additional \$20,000 in gas, grocery, and pharmacy cards to families who needed them. We also provided 58 hotel stays to families forced to travel for treatment.

Through our Transportation Fund, we helped 80 families with car payments, gas cards, and other transportation needs in the total amount of \$30,150.

### OPEN ARMS MEAL PROGRAM

Gathering around the table is what families do. CURE is committed to ensuring families in treatment don't lose that opportunity. Through the generosity of donors and with the help of dedicated volunteers, we serve meals three to four times each week at the Scottish Rite and Egleston campuses of the Aflac Cancer and Blood Disorders Center at Children's Healthcare of Atlanta and at Memorial Hospital in Savannah. Open Arms Meals not only strengthen the

bonds we build with families, they help ease some of the financial burdens long hospital stays often create.

In 2018–2019, we served meals to more than 17,500 patients, family members, and hospital staff. We also delivered another 757 brown bag lunches and provided 1839 snack bags to families who may have had unexpected admissions or surprisingly long clinic visits.



### CURE'S COUNSELING PROGRAM

Childhood cancer treatment doesn't only take a physical toll. Its aftermath can leave children and their families with mental and emotional trauma. To help, CURE offers patients, siblings, and parents the opportunity to receive professional counseling

at little or no cost through our Counseling Program. Through the Summit Counseling Center and other therapists throughout the State of Georgia, we provided 206 counseling sessions in 2018-2019.

### BEREAVEMENT CARE

While we work for a day when every child survives their cancer, the unfortunate reality is that we aren't there yet. We grieve for every child lost, and our commitment to caring for grieving families never ends. In addition to offering counseling, we hold two retreats uniquely suited for bereaved

families. In January 2019, our Weekend of Hope and Healing brought together 77 parents who have lost their children and in March, 30 parents who are further along in their grief attended our Legacy of Love retreat.

### AND THERE IS SO MUCH MORE.

CURE's goal of being an ever-present help to families in crisis encompasses dozens of services designed to lighten the load of the families and make sure they know they aren't alone. We provide toiletry bags to families who have unexpected stays and boredom buster bags to give kids a little boost while in treatment. Through our Holiday Angels program, we were able to make the season a little brighter for 110 families in treatment. Sensing the

need of a respite for families during long-term hospital stays, CURE developed a respite program to give caregivers a break. We created a nurse's respite room, which provides nurses a comfortable, soothing, private space to process the tough things they see and do. We also help childhood cancer survivors with fertility preservation when their ability to have a family in the future may have been compromised by treatment.

When a child faces end of life, CURE is there with comfort baskets, and each year we send grieving parents an anniversary card to make sure they know CURE will never forget their child. In 2018-2019, we sent 496 of these handwritten cards and received many notes of thanks in return. Thank you for allowing us to be there when people need us most.



## A Legacy of Compassion

If you waved at Michael Mudge, it's doubtful you would have received a wave in return. More than likely, you'd have gotten a warm smile and one of his signature shakas – a hand gesture residents of Hawaii use to convey the Aloha spirit. It is a sign of friendship, compassion, and respect. Michael was born in Hawaii and spent his first twelve years there before moving to Bluffton, South Carolina.

In Bluffton, Michael grew to become a typical high school teenager. He liked playing Xbox, loved football (he was a huge fan of Joe Montana and the San Francisco 49ers), was looking forward to getting his driver's license, and was taking classes to pursue a future career in law enforcement. But he was getting thin, and he started complaining of severe leg pain, abdominal pain, and headaches. A doctor said these were just growing pains, but just days later, Michael was in urgent care with a collapsed lung.

Two hospital transfers via ambulance in a matter of hours and several tests later, he received devastating news. On Halloween 2017, Michael and his mother, Jessica, were told that he most likely had cancer. He had a large mass and would need surgery for a biopsy. The result came back as high-risk (stage 4) alveolar rhabdomyosarcoma (ARMS), an aggressive soft tissue cancer. Although they were fairly new to Bluffton at the time of the diagnosis, their neighbors rallied to their side. The high school principal, teachers, classmates, and several police officers stopped in to visit. Early on, Captain Joe Babkiewicz of the Bluffton Police Department and Michael formed a strong friendship based on their passion for law enforcement and

football. Recognizing his qualities of courage, strength, and compassion, Captain Babkiewicz made Michael an honorary Bluffton police officer and designated him a "True Hero."

Michael endured months of high-intensity chemotherapy treatments, surgery to remove the mass, and the lifetime amount of radiation to his lung and abdomen. For a while, the treatment seemed to work, and Michael was counting down his remaining treatments with hopes of remission and returning to high school. Unfortunately, nine months into treatment, the cancer returned with a vengeance and Michael was given days to live.

Proving his status as a hero, Michael accepted his fate and asked to enroll in a trial to help other children, even after being told it would not help him. He was scheduled for an appointment, but his health deteriorated quickly, leaving him unable to travel for the trial. Michael passed away on August 28, 2018 at the age of 16.

When Michael knew his time on earth was coming to an end, he again showed the compassion for which he had been commended. He told his friends and family that his desire was to see an end to pediatric cancer so that children diagnosed after him would have hope of a long life. In response, his mother and brother, Matthew, have created Michael's Fund 4 a CURE, a new Named Fund of CURE Childhood Cancer. The primary purpose of the fund is to invest in precision medicine – which brings personalized medicine to children with cancer. It is his family's desire that Michael's legacy of compassion will lead to a day of new hope for children diagnosed with cancer.

## THE ANNA CHARLES HOLLIS FUND

Anna Charles Hollis was spunky, determined, and loved to dance. At six years old, she was diagnosed with acute myeloid leukemia (AML). The treatment used to try to save her devastated her little body. A spinal tap left her paralyzed from the waist down, and four rounds of chemotherapy damaged her heart. Anna Charles passed away on September 18, 2018 with her family by her side. Her parents created the Anna Charles Hollis Fund to advance research into AML.

## TEAM ALEXA FIGHTING BACK FUND

Sweet Alexa was full of laughter and joy. She wore a contagious smile even when diagnosed with an aggressive brain tumor called sPNET. Alexa was a fighter, and she showed what fierce determination looked like, right up until the very end. After four relapses, Alexa's life was cut short. She passed away in February 2015. Her family created Team Alexa Fighting Back to support CURE's ongoing patient and family support programs, such as the Open Arms Meal Program and Family Emergency Fund.



## THE CARLOS S. ALVARADO, M.D. PEDIATRIC CANCER RESEARCH FUND

Dr. Carlos Alvarado is a retired pediatric oncologist who served children with cancer for more than three decades. Although now retired, his care for children continues with his service to CURE's Scientific Advisory Council. The Carlos S. Alvarado, M.D. Pediatric Research Fund continues Dr. Alvarado's work by funding lifesaving research at the Aflac Cancer and Blood Disorders Center at Children's Healthcare of Atlanta.



## THE CARTER MARTIN FUND

Carter Martin was diagnosed with Ewing sarcoma in January 2003. He endured aggressive chemotherapy, radiation, and a radical amputation but immediately relapsed. His treatment included several trial drugs, but nothing worked. When confronted with his fate, Carter made a request of his mother, saying, "Mom, get my piggy bank and give all of the money to childhood cancer so no other kid has to suffer like me." Honoring his wish through the Piggy Bank Bash in 2018, The Carter Martin Fund supports CURE's precision medicine initiative.



## CATIE'S FUND

Catie Wilkins was funny, loving, and mischievous. She was diagnosed with medulloblastoma on her first birthday and fought fearlessly. But the chemotherapy had compromised her immune system so severely that she succumbed to a common virus before she reached her 5th birthday. Her family founded Catie's Fund, and through their Sisters on a Journey Dinners, the fund supports CURE's precision medicine efforts in hopes that other children will get to live a full lifetime.

His family created the Creedlove Fund and held their first InCREEDible Egg Drop in 2019, which recreated one of the happiest days of Creed's short life. Proceeds from the Creedlove Fund provide support to patients undergoing treatment for childhood cancer and their families.



**JACK'S FUND**

Jack Kennedy was bigger than life and an ardent supporter of CURE. His death in January 2017 was unexpected because, unlike his love for the children we serve, Jack kept his own fight with cancer private. Jack's Fund was launched in May 2017 to honor the man we adored. Jack wanted every child to have the opportunity to live a life full of the love and laughter he cherished, so proceeds from Jack's Fund are directed toward life-saving pediatric cancer research.

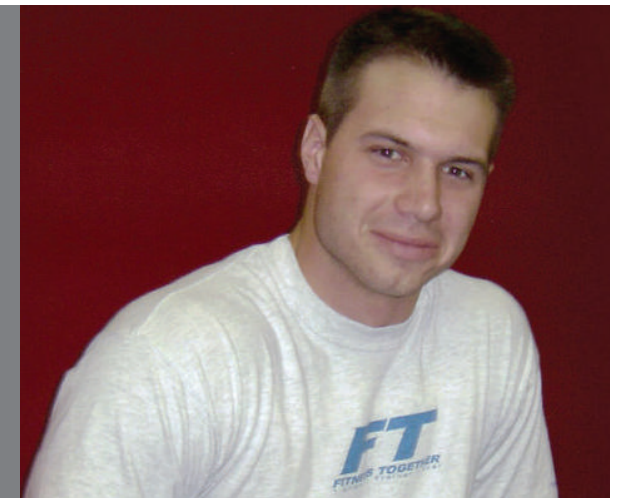
**MICHAEL'S FUND 4 A CURE**

Michael Mugrage was noted for his courage, strength, and compassion – traits that earned him the title of honorary police officer during his battle with alveolar rhabdomyosarcoma. Michael fought hard, but a cure eluded him. Compassionate to the end, he tried to enroll in a clinical trial to help other children, even after being told it would not help him. His family created Michael's Fund 4 a CURE to support Michael's desire to find a cure. The primary purpose of the fund is to advance precision medicine.



**THE SAM ROBB FUND**

Sam Robb was a gifted and talented athlete who did everything big. When osteosarcoma invaded his life, he lived by his motto, "Fightin' till the last breath." Sam died on the operating table on June 25, 2007. In his memory, his family created the Sam Robb Fund to ensure that his spirit and determination live on. Through three annual events, this fund supports the training of the Sam Robb Fellow and CURE's Counseling Program.



**THE TRENTON W. KINDRED RESEARCH FUND**

Trenton Kindred was diagnosed with stage IV neuroblastoma shortly after his first birthday. After a very hard 19-month fight, Trenton was declared cancer-free and hasn't looked back. Now in high school, he loves football, and his favorite subject is history. Even though Trenton was an infant when he battled cancer, he recognizes the fight kids go through and says, "No kid should ever have to put up with cancer and all of the scars it leaves behind." Trenton's Fund raises money to advance neuroblastoma research.



**UNITED FOR A CURE**

United for a CURE is named after three children with the same diagnosis. Mary Elizabeth, Melissa, and Lake became friends during their treatment, as did their families. All three fought hard against tremendous odds, but each succumbed to the disease. Together the Paris, Depa, and Thompson families formed United for a CURE in an effort to honor their own children while supporting other children battling acute myeloid leukemia (AML). The purpose of United for a CURE is to fund clinical research relating to AML.

On March 23, 2019, a sold-out crowd of more than 450 people filled the Stave Room at American Spirit Whiskey for a night of live music, signature cocktails, dancing, and fun. While the energy was unforgettable, the evening served a greater purpose as nearly \$110,000 was raised to help fund critical pediatric cancer research and to provide support to patients and their families.

### LAUREN'S RUN AND THE CURE CHILDHOOD CANCER ANNUAL PICNIC

### BELIEVE BALL

The sixth annual Believe Ball was an inspiring and incredible evening. Presented by Delta Air Lines and Novelis, this elegant event was held at the beautiful St. Regis Atlanta. 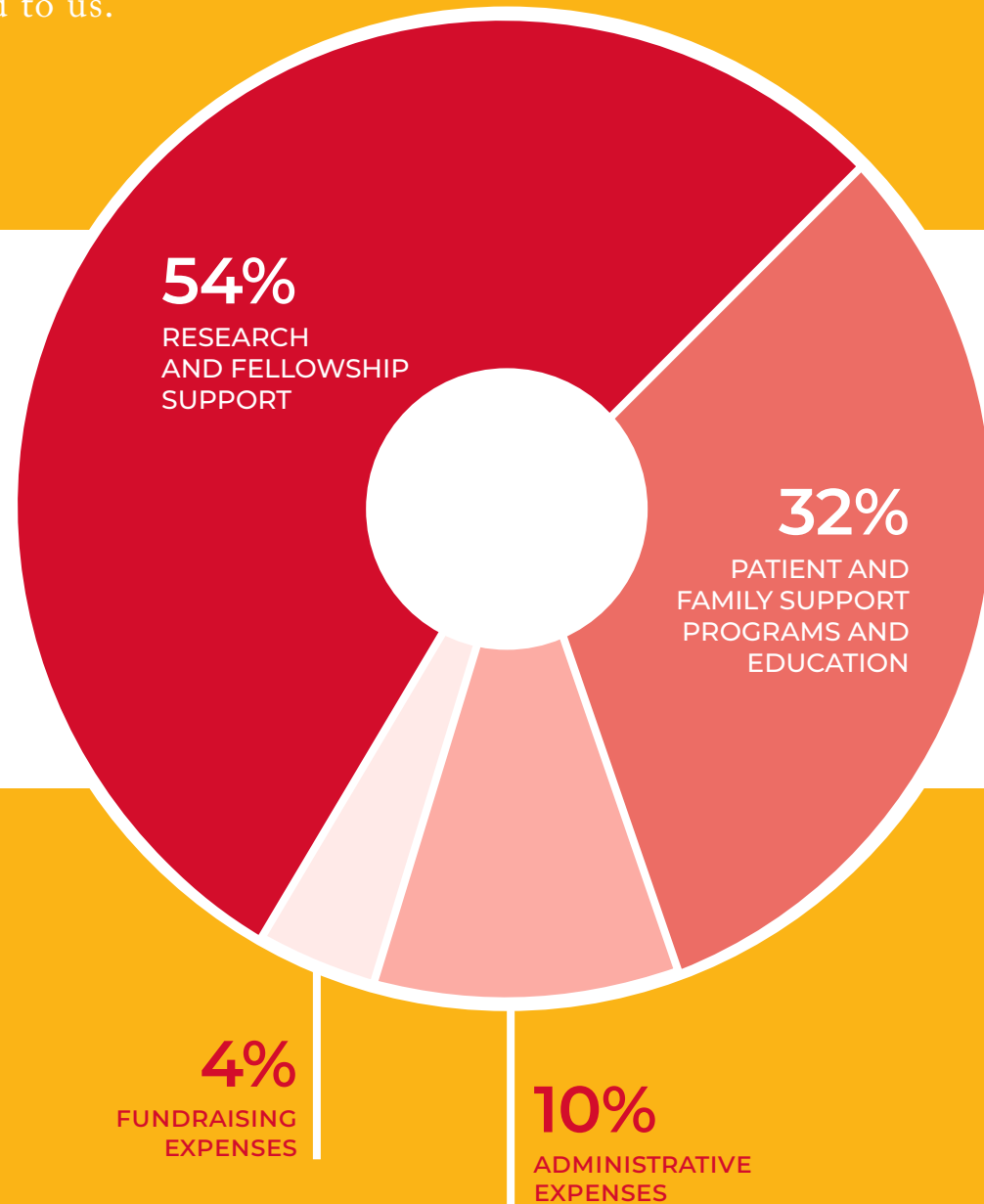
