

A LETTER FROM THE CEO O Kristin Connor

Dear Friends.

CURE's fiscal 2021–2022 was a difficult year in many ways and also very exciting! When the year started, the COVID-19 pandemic was still impacting our fundraising, special events, and patient services. The families we serve were also still dealing with heavy economic and emotional burdens, and we knew that the need for emergency financial support, lodging, transportation assistance, and counseling would continue to grow. As I look back at what transpired in those 12 months, I can only say thank you. What a year it was!

Despite the challenges, you gave more support than ever before – a record \$9.2 million. Thanks to you, we made the largest research disbursement (\$4.7 million) in a single grant cycle in our 47-year history, which means promising research for difficult childhood cancers is moving forward. You also enabled us to provide significant help to the families we serve. None of this would have been possible without your generosity.

Our \$1.5 million allocation to precision medicine pushed our total investment in this innovative approach to treating childhood cancers to \$10 million. Precision medicine means treating physicians are armed with critical genetic information in order to tailor a child's treatment plan specifically to them. Incredibly, of the children with access to genetic sequencing through the CURE-funded precision medicine program, 85% received findings that impacted their treatments.

Take a look at the other research your support is advancing. With your funding, seventeen research labs across the United States are working urgently on getting new treatments to children with hard-to-treat brain tumors, leukemias, sarcomas, and solid tumors in the next two to three years.

Thanks to you, CURE also continued to be a present help to families in the fight. We provided the most emergency financial assistance in the organization's history to help families with mortgage and rent payments, utility bills, short-term lodging, gas expenses, and more. We served more than 16,000 meals to children in hospitals and their parents and provided a record number of counseling sessions to children battling cancer, survivors, siblings, and/or parents. You also provided holiday gifts for 118 families. You ensured our support didn't stop for families who endured unthinkable loss either. Your gifts allowed us to help 29 families with funeral expenses and host 121 parents and caregivers at bereavement retreats.

It is so important to us that you know how deeply impactful your giving has been. Thank you for entrusting us with your donations.

We Are All Unique

Our focus on advancing the use of precision medicine to treat children with cancer launched in 2017 and has been our highest priority since then, with a total investment of \$10 million. The vision of precision medicine is to provide personalized, non-toxic, and curative therapy for all children with cancer by genetically mapping a child's tumor and targeting the problem mutations.

Since 2017, 85% of the children who received genetic mapping with CURE's funding found their treatments impacted by the information obtained. But the impact of precision medicine goes well beyond the child's cancer treatment.

Genetic testing can change a diagnosis or reveal a genetic predisposition to cancer that can affect a family for generations. You will see this in the stories of Jo'bri and Finn in the pages ahead.

With such life-altering results, your donations allowed us to invest \$1.5 million in advancing precision medicine in 2021–2022, enabling more children with high risk or refractory cancer to receive genetic sequencing. Every child is unique. Thanks to your support, their cancer treatments can be too.

"When we talk about Precision Medicine, the first thing that comes to mind is the ability to identify a specific mutation in a patient's tumor that leads to a change in therapy that impacts survival. While that is a goal of precision medicine, there are other potential benefits that can directly affect patients – for example, identifying a cancer predisposition syndrome that can impact the patient or their family; suggesting that a patient might be eligible for a particular clinical trial, or refining or even changing a diagnosis that results in the patient being exposed to less toxic therapy."

Investing in the Future

The road to becoming a pediatric oncologist is long and can be very expensive. After attaining an MD or PhD, aspiring oncologists must complete a three-year fellowship program. By this time, many of these young doctors already have large student loan debts. The bleak financial picture can be a disincentive to many considering a career in caring for children with cancer.

In order to ensure that the best and brightest young doctors will stay on the path to treating children with cancer, CURE funds the training of pediatric fellows at Emory University School of Medicine. This funding removes the financial impediments that may cause young doctors to forego the three years of additional training required and choose another specialty.

Each year, The Sam Robb Fund supports one fellow, and an endowment created by the Connolly Family Foundation ensures funding of a second fellow. Our fundraising covers the training costs of the third fellow. CURE's 2021–2022 fellows are beyond impressive. We are encouraged to know they will be caring for children with cancer in the coming years.

Dr. Chien obtained his undergraduate degree in computer science at Swarthmore College and his MD at Thomas Jefferson University. Throughout his fellowship and beyond, he hopes to advance pediatric and adolescent cancer care by developing novel computational strategies to aid in big-data analysis and research.



DR. ROBERT LISAC (SAM ROBB FELLOW)

Dr. Lisac earned his MD at the University of Central Florida and completed his residency at the University of Florida. Dr. Lisac was diagnosed with acute lymphoblastic leukemia at the age of 12. His leukemia subsequently relapsed, requiring a bone marrow transplant followed by nearly four years of complications. He plans to specialize in bone marrow transplant and survivorship.



DR. SANYU JANARDAN (CONNOLLY FAMILY FELLOW)

Dr. Janardan earned her MD at the University of Minnesota and completed her pediatrics residency at Yale. Her fellowship research will focus on studying barriers to exercise in childhood cancer survivors.

Jo'bri's Story

One spring evening, Jo'bri complained of a stomachache after supper. When her mother, Joseline, felt a bump on Jo'bri's stomach, they went right to the hospital, where a CT scan revealed a tumor the size of a football attached to her kidney. Two days later, Jo'bri had surgery to remove the tumor and her kidney. The surgeon said that the tumor had eaten practically the entire kidney.

Jo'bri was diagnosed with Wilms' tumor, the most common cancer of the kidneys in children. With appropriate treatment, the outlook for most children with Wilms' tumor is very good. Fortunately, Jo'bri's was a stage 1 tumor. After a week of radiation and six months of chemotherapy, she was declared cancer-free. But only for a time.

In May 2019, Jo'bri began experiencing pain in her chest and had difficulty breathing. After several trips to the doctor, Joseline took Jo'bri to the hospital and demanded a CT scan. Jo'bri's cancer had returned. There were tumors compressing her heart and cutting off the oxygen flow from her lungs. She had to be put on a ventilator to help her breathe. She went through more chemotherapy to prepare for a stem cell transplant in late 2019. The transplant was successful, and she has been cancerfree ever since.

A scare in 2020 caused Jo'bri's doctors to send her to Atlanta for genetic testing through the Aflac Precision Medicine Program (APMP), a program launched in partnership with and funded by CURE.

Precision medicine is a form of treatment where doctors look at the genetic makeup of a child's cancer and then search for a treatment designed specifically to target the genetic mutations causing the cancer to grow. In some patients, testing may identify genetic changes that are passed down in families and explain why a child developed cancer to begin with. If "inherited" mutations are found, other family members may be tested to see if they, too, have the cancercausing mutation.

In Jo'bri's case, the testing identified a mutation of a gene called BRIP1. The BRIP1 gene normally helps prevent cancers. A mutation in this gene causes it to stop working as it should and increases the risk for certain types of cancers. The precision medicine team knew that if Jo'bri's mother, Joseline, had the same mutation, she would have a higher risk of breast and ovarian cancer.

"My father passed away from brain cancer five years ago," said Joseline. "So I took this information very seriously. I've told everyone in my family that they need to take precautions and get some form of cancer screening. Life is too precious to let things go and not take care of your health."

After Jo'bri's treatment was over, Joseline underwent genetic testing, where doctors discovered that she does indeed have the same mutation. Knowing this, Joseline will work with her doctors to create a plan to monitor her body and act quickly should cancer develop. The discoveries from Jo'bri's genetic testing can warn other family members that they may have a predisposition to cancer, as well. If they do, they can manage their cancer risk and ensure early intervention should there be a problem. This knowledge could save lives for years to come.











Providing Hope for Families in Need

When a child is diagnosed with cancer, the whole family is affected. One parent compared his child's diagnosis to a wrecking ball hitting the dinner table during a quiet meal. Each family member may experience a wide range of emotions, and it can be difficult to believe that life will ever be the same. At CURE, we understand what families are going through, and we walk alongside families through this difficult experience.

While restrictions and fallout from the COVID-19 pandemic eased somewhat during 2021–2022, the struggles of families with sick children did not. Thanks to you, CURE was there. We returned to serving meals to children and their parents in the hospitals. We held our **three bereavement retreats** in person. And we were finally able to resume visiting families in the outpatient clinics – which is a key touchpoint for us to meet new families.

Because of you, we were able to grow our existing services and even provide some new ones. In December, we kicked off a **Holiday Box of Cheer** program, where donors provided everything necessary to make hospital rooms cheery and bright for children who spent the holidays in the hospitals. We also started a **food pantry** at Children's Healthcare of Atlanta's Egleston campus so families have access to sustenance 24 hours a day. Thank you for allowing us to support families even more in 2021–2022.

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CURE brings a lot of relief to families facing this horrible monster. This journey is different for every child who takes it, but organizations like CURE fill gaps you wouldn't even know existed until they come through and provide what you didn't know you needed.

You are **not** alone.

When a child is diagnosed with cancer, parents often face work disruption in order to care for their child. Statistics tell us that approximately 64% of Americans live paycheck to paycheck. So regardless of income level, it doesn't take long to reach a state of financial crisis. Thanks to our donors, we were able to help 518 families by providing \$445,368 in emergency financial assistance in the form of rent, utility payments, prescriptions, and more – a 31% increase over the prior fiscal year.

Serving meals in the hospitals is an excellent way for us to support families and provide a basic need. We were thrilled that COVID restrictions lifted somewhat, allowing our staff to resume serving the meals and providing much more effective hands-on support. In 2021–2022, we provided more than **16,000 meals**.

We are sincerely grateful for your support. We were in crisis and you got our car running so we could go to treatments.

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With your support, we not only provided for the family's physical needs, but through CURE's Counseling Program, we were able to assist with the emotional and psychological fallout from childhood cancer. In 2021–2022, your donations allowed us to provide **288 counseling sessions** to children with cancer, survivors, parents, and siblings. As you can see from Paul's story on page 14, counseling can be a lifeline for some families.


So families know they are not alone, we introduce ourselves as soon as possible after diagnosis. You allowed us to provide **350 tote bags** containing helpful items along with tips from parents who have been there to newly diagnosed families. For families who must travel long distances for treatment, your support enabled us to provide **168 nights** of hotel stays.

The holidays can be a difficult time during treatment. With your help, we provided **gifts for 118 families**, ensuring patients, parents, and siblings could experience some holiday joy. To make hospital stays a little more comfortable, we also distributed thousands of laundry kits, pillowcases, fleece blankets, fleece pillows, books, socks, and boredom buster bags assembled and donated by our amazing community.

Even when the unthinkable occurs, CURE is there. For those who lost their child to cancer, we hosted our Weekend of Hope and Healing, Legacy of Love, and a Hope and Healing Day, where 121 parents and caregivers received encouragement and comfort. Your donations also helped with funeral expenses for 29 families who had nowhere else to turn.

Paul's Story

In the summer of 2020, Paul and his family were enjoying a mountain vacation. Although he had been experiencing intermittent leg pain, he never let it slow him down, and he didn't complain. So when an x-ray revealed a tumor in his right femur, his parents were shocked.

"We thought Paul had a muscle injury, or possibly a bone infection," Paul's mother, Charlotte Marie, said. "We weren't prepared to hear the words cancer or Ewing sarcoma."

The bad news continued as further testing revealed more than 100 tumors in Paul's lungs and a lesion on his spine and left femur. After nine rounds of chemotherapy, his lungs were clear, and the tumors on his left femur and spine were gone. The next step in his treatment was surgery to remove half of his right femur and replace it with a telescoping rod that will expand as Paul grows. Following the surgery, Paul endured more chemo and radiation until he was declared cancer-free in June 2021.

"Paul put his head down and handled treatment very well," shared his father, Jonathan. "We had a goal of getting to the finish line of treatment, and we focused 100% of our energy on that day. What we weren't prepared for was the day after."

After a year of being entirely consumed by Paul's health, Jonathan and Charlotte Marie began to take stock of the unseen toll of his treatment. They describe Paul as an "old soul" who was slightly stoic before cancer. But his experience increased that stoicism. He has also become very protective of his family and doesn't want them to feel sad. So he tries to manage his own emotions so no one worries about him.

"In many ways, his innocence was stolen from him," Jonathan said. "Instead of going to kindergarten, he was getting a port placed in his chest and beginning chemo. That's a lot for anyone to deal with, much less a six-year-old."

Paul's parents turned to CURE for help, and Paul now works with a therapist to help unlock his feelings about his cancer experience and to learn how to express his emotions. It seems to be helping him greatly. But Paul wasn't the only one who needed support.

"We started seeing a counselor through CURE's Counseling Program," said Jonathan. "Everything about the year in treatment hit us, and we weren't prepared to process it all. It has been very helpful to carve out an hour to talk to someone who can help us work through these things. We also get to hear each other's side of the trauma."


"I feel like we woke up after treatment ended and had to deal with many issues we had buried while we focused on getting Paul better," added Charlotte Marie. "I'm glad we weren't alone and had a third party helping us resolve these things. It's been a truly invaluable resource. Jonathan and I are in a better place because of the counseling we've done."

After working through a couple of very traumatic years, the future is looking much brighter for Paul's family. Jonathan and Charlotte Marie would encourage others to seek counseling when needed as everyone can use some help processing such a terrifying and stressful experience.












Finn's Story

At a routine pediatrician's visit when Finn was three years old, his doctor noticed that his walking was unsteady and ordered an MRI. The test showed that Finn had hydrocephalus, a build-up of fluid in the brain. The cause of the excess fluid was far more sinister – there was a tumor on Finn's brain.

"Some of the things the doctor noticed were indicative of autism, so we were preparing ourselves for something of that nature," said Finn's mother, Kim. "We were shocked and devastated when he told us our baby boy had a brain tumor."

Finn's parents didn't think things could get worse until a biopsy deemed the tumor to be an aggressive, high-grade glioma. Brain surgery to remove it became inevitable. While preparations for surgery were underway, a sample of the tumor was sent for genetic testing through the Aflac Precision Medicine Program at Children's Healthcare of Atlanta, which is fully funded by CURE.

"We were getting set for this major surgery but had to delay it because Finn had a positive COVID test," Kim said. "Finn didn't look or act sick. He was still my goofy, angelic child with the sweetest soul."

While they waited for Finn to get better, the tumor continued growing, and his hydrocephalus returned. After waiting another month, surgeons were able to remove 75% of the tumor. They were unable to take the rest due to its proximity to the optic nerve.

While Finn recovered, the results of his genetic tests returned and proved very interesting.

Finn's tumor was not a high-grade glioma. It turns out that while his tumor grows at a rate that makes it appear high-grade, it is actually a low-grade optic glioma. This news drastically changed Finn's treatment path.

"When we thought it was high-grade, our next steps included a very toxic chemotherapy regimen combined with cranial radiation," explained Kim. "Since genetic testing proved the pathology was incorrect, Finn didn't have to endure radiation and his chemo was much less aggressive."

Over the past twenty years, science has made incredible leaps in discovery by finding genetic barcodes – our DNA and RNA. We now understand what healthy cells look like and can often find triggers or markers in a tumor where something went wrong with a gene. Precision medicine seeks to locate and isolate that problem and hopefully find chemotherapies or other treatments proven effective against it. thus improving survival rates while minimizing exposure to toxic treatments that are not likely to work.

As our knowledge of cancer genetics has grown, so have the applications. In Finn's case, while no target was discovered, changing his tumor's diagnosis led to a treatment path with much less potential for life-altering side effects. The change also allowed him to enter a clinical trial that yielded excellent results. After six months, the remaining tumor had shrunk by 50%.

As Finn's coordination has improved, he is able to enjoy gymnastics lessons and playing with his sister. Despite the season, you can often find him wearing his Santa hat because he is obsessed with Christmas. He's come a long way since the tumor was discovered, and he still faces a long road. But thanks to precision medicine and an accurate diagnosis, Finn is meeting the challenges with a plan that is tailored to meet his needs

ensuring they had a joyful holiday season. We love DMA's enthusiasm for the families we serve and can't wait to continue this partnership.






The Golf Classic **Benefiting CURE**

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
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
